

Court reporters create word-for-word transcriptions at trials, depositions, and other legal proceedings. Some court reporters provide captioning for television and real-time translation for deaf or hard-of-hearing people at public events, in business meetings, or in classrooms.

Court Reporters in California typically do the following:

- Attend events that require written transcripts, record spoken dialogue with specialized equipment, such as covered microphone
- Review notes for names of speakers and technical terminology , prepare transcripts for the record
- Edit transcripts for typographical errors, Provide copies of transcripts and recordings to the courts, counsels, and parties involved Court reporters create word-for-word transcripts of speeches, conversations, legal proceedings, meetings, and other events
